

Widening the Circle of Cancer Care for Aboriginal Peoples

An Arts-Based, Participatory Dialogue

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Phases

Parent Study¹: We are conducting a national photovoice study of First Nations, Inuit, and Métis (FNIM) women living with cancer, in partnership with Saint Elizabeth Health Care.

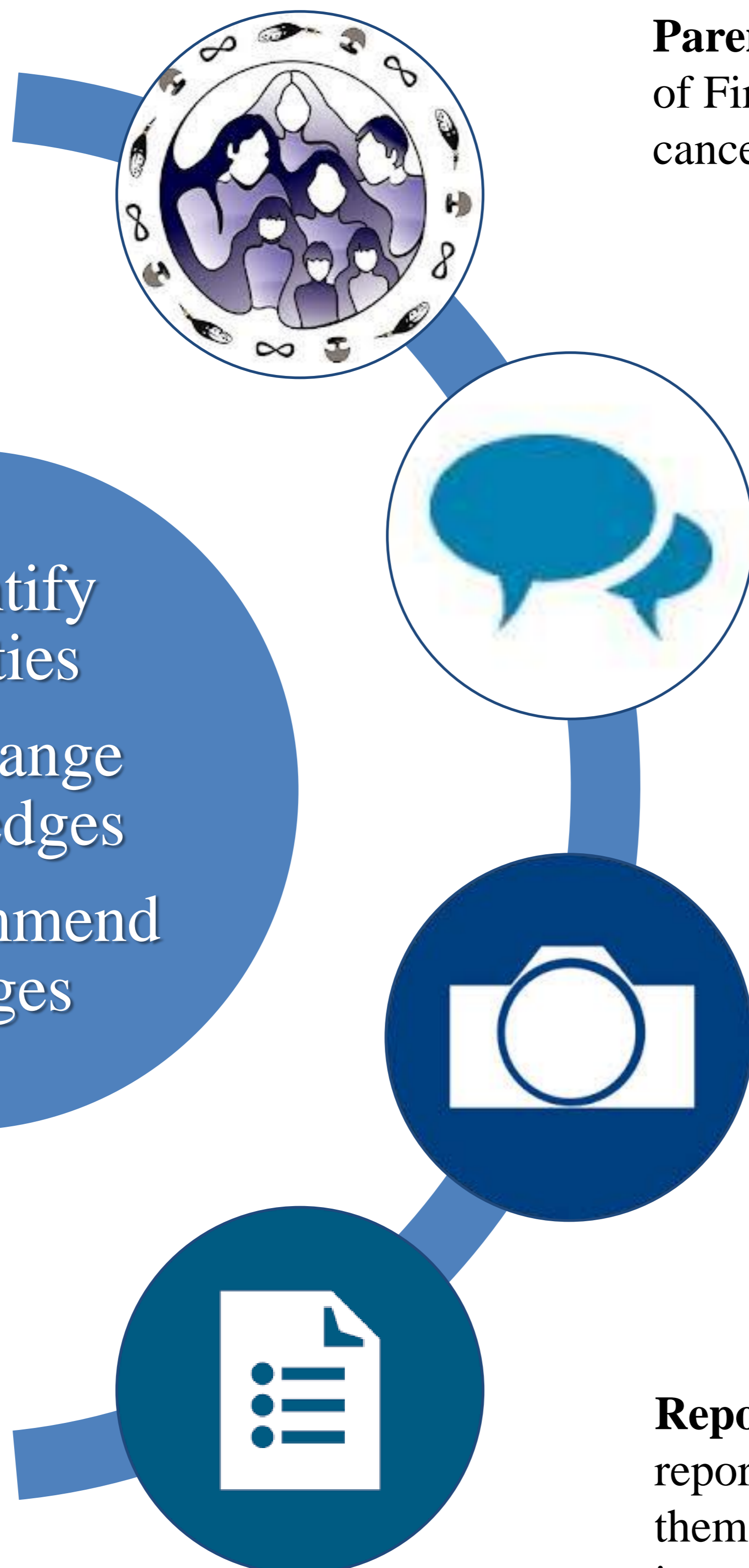
Postdoc Study Development^{2,3}: Hammond is consulting with an array of stakeholders involved in FNIM cancer care across Ontario (e.g., regional cancer and Aboriginal health centres). These consultations and results from the parent study will inform the postdoc research questions and objectives.

Photovoice and Photo-elicitation: 10 health care professionals will be recruited to use photography to share their experiences with FNIM cancer care. Photos from them and from the parent study will be used to elicit discussion with 5 health care administrators and 5 FNIM community leaders.

Report Development: In collaboration with participants, a report will be generated that incorporates various experiences, themes, and perspectives, with a focus on how they may translate into services and materials for knowledge users.
